I. Introduction

The African Internet Exchange Task Force (AFIX-TF) held a two-day combined EN-ISPA and technical training workshop (with a short decision maker for all participants at the beginning) in Yaoundé Cameroon, at "ESSTIC" (Ecole Supérieure des Sciences et Techniques de l'Information et de la Communication) from Tuesday 4 July to Thursday 6 July 2006. VI. Conclusion & follow up

Almost 100% of participants are satisfied. The length of the workshop became a problem for this workshop, because we had both AFIX and En-ISPA together (since the number of participants was not enough to split in 2 groups), 75% of participants found the length of the workshop right, but 25% found it too short. 88% found the pace right. While 63% were very satisfied, 38% were somewhat satisfied. There is now an ISPA but not operating, participants will work on reactivation of the ISPA. Unfortunately the local host did not notify participants on time, so first day could not start, only 2 participants were there. He managed to call and confirm participants for the second day so we could start.
